The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable

Development, adopted by all United Nations Member States in 2015, provides a shared blueprint for peace and prosperity for people and the planet, now and into the future. At its heart are the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), which are an urgent call for action by all countries - developed and developing - in a global partnership. They recognize that ending poverty and other deprivations must go hand-in-hand with strategies that improve health and education, reduce inequality, and spur economic growth - all while tackling climate change and working to preserve our oceans and forests.

Since its introduction in 2015, the Sustainable Development Goals

(SDGs) have been a transformative global agenda incorporating the vision of sustainable, just, and equitable development in economic, social, and environmental aspects. With the reframing of international cooperation policy in 2016, the launch of Feminist International Assistance Policy (FIAP) in 2017, these have been critical points where Canadian organizations and development practitioners reinvigorate our strategies to ensure a peaceful, inclusive and prosperous society that leaves no one behind. OCIC believes these goals can be accomplished both in Canada and abroad by working creatively and collaboratively at both the local and global level.



BIOS

Edna Ali (she/her)

Civic engagement, particularly where it concerns communities systematically left out civic spaces, is something close to Edna's heart. This has led her to do work around leadership capacity building for young people and antioppressive city-building with institutions like the City of Toronto, organizations like the Canadian Council of Muslim Women, and community-based initiatives in her community of Etobicoke-York.

Previously, Edna served as Executive Director of the Toronto Youth Cabinet, where she was responsible for the management of the Leadership Team and the organization as a whole. As Executive Director, Edna fostered inclusive leadership among her peers to empower and mentor diverse youth to become leaders in their own right.
